



Advent and Advent Wreath:



What is Advent?

Well, Happy New Year!

Our Church Year begins on the First Sunday of Advent. Advent means "arrival" or "coming" in Latin and is a season of waiting and preparation for Jesus' miraculous birth.

Why Advent Wreath?

An Evergreen Wreath is a symbol that has been around for longer than Christianity has! We borrowed it, probably during the Middle Ages in Europe, because we like to borrow symbols and because the circle is a symbol of new life, unity and of eternity. Evergreens also symbolize the persistence of life, even in the depths of winter.

What do the Candles mean?

Each week we light an additional candle on the wreath. Three of them are purple. Purple was traditionally a color used for royalty and we use it to symbolize Christ's kingship. It is also a somber, meditative color and the color we see before the dawning of a new day.

On the third Sunday of Advent, we light a pink or rose candle. The third Sunday is known as Gaudete Sunday from the Latin word "rejoice." On Gaudete Sunday, just past halfway through Advent, we begin to look towards the joy of the Christmas celebration, so it is a lighter, more joyful rose. It is also the color we see at early dawn ... when the sun is beginning to rise. The accumulation of light is an expression of the growing anticipation of the birth of Jesus Christ, who is seen as the light of the world.

What should we do with our Advent Wreath??

One traditional thing to do with an Advent Wreath is to light the appropriate candles as you gather for a meal with your friends and family, saying a prayer while someone lights the candles. The Advent Wreath can also simply be the focal point for your times of prayer. Following are the prayers, which we call Collects, that we say at the beginning of the Sunday service each week in Advent. You can use these Collects, one of the other suggested prayers, or any other prayer as your candle lighting prayer during each week of Advent.

First Sunday of Advent (Light one purple candle):

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Or try this ...

From the Hymnal 1982 #52:

Oh God this day upon us shine and fill our souls with light divine. Amen.

Second Sunday of Advent (Light two purple candles):

Merciful God, who sent your messengers the prophets to preach repentance

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and prepare the way for our salvation: Give us grace to heed their warnings and forsake our sins, that we may greet with joy the coming of Jesus Christ our Redeemer, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

Or try this ...

From the Book of Common Prayer, p 159:

Almighty God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness and put upon us the armor of light. *Amen.*

Third Sunday of Advent (Light two purple and one pink candle):

Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among us; and, because we are sorely hindered by our sins, let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and for ever. *Amen.*

Or try this:

From the Prophet Isaiah:

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has dawned upon you.

For behold, darkness covers the land; deep gloom enshrouds the peoples.

But over you the Lord will rise, and his glory will appear upon you.

Nations will stream to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawning. *Amen*

Fourth Sunday of Advent (Light three purple and one pink candle):

Purify our conscience, Almighty God, by your daily visitation, that your Son Jesus Christ, at his coming, may find in us a mansion prepared for himself; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

Or try this ...

From the Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-48)

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior;

for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed:

The Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name. Amen.
